## HOME COMING GAME TONIGHT

### CARNIVAL INTAKE BEST IN PAST FEW YEARS

With the total intake near \$1816 the annual Hallowe'en Carnival was a success another year.

The largest single intake was \$740 from the bale of cotton sale sponsored by the Rotary Club. Proceeds go the Crippled Adult Hospital. Ringo was conducted by the junior and senior classes and netted \$217; advertising by the football boys, \$224; the boy scouts' pig \$18; door receipts \$120; senior class machines, \$36; seventh grade, \$43; ninth, \$46; tenth grade, \$46; eight, \$22; Home Ec. Club, \$30.

Fourth, fifth, and sixth grades, \$40; first and second grades, \$28; F.F.A., \$17; girls athletic club, \$24; senior chances, \$15; and P.T.A. \$160.

Some of the feature attractions were throwing at dummies of teachers, pie walks, pinning tail on a cat, ringing bottles, and pitching pennies. (Cont. p. 4.)

During the summer the entire lunch room was painted. In the kitchen a new butane stove, a huge dishwasher, and a steam table were installed.

The serving is done by girls in high school, who work hard to keep the plates served and the line moving. Students should be thankful for the generous servings of food which they receive.

A typical menu of the cafeteria is a meat, two vegetables, a salad, dessert, bread, milk or tea---all for fifteen cents. Where else could we get a meal like this for fifteen cents? The cafeteria opens at 11:15. The first four grades receive served plates at the tables. Beginning with the fifth grade, the students pass through the line and receive served plates from a steam table.

Although we students are seldom guilty of bad manners we sometimes are thoughtless and inconsiderate. Often we cause extra work by sticking gum on trays and plates.

Sometimes we forget and give the line a little shove to help it along. Perhaps we break in line. Just remember that the fellow in line is as hungry and anxious for food as you.

With so many improvements and the lifting of food bans, we can have better meals at our school cafeteria.

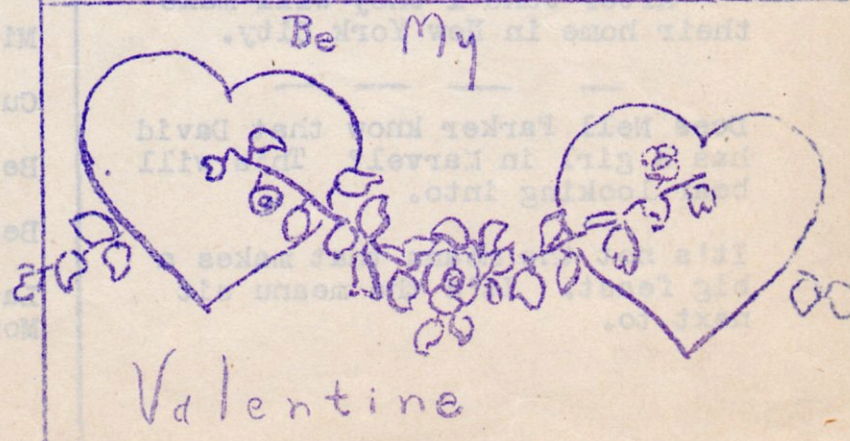

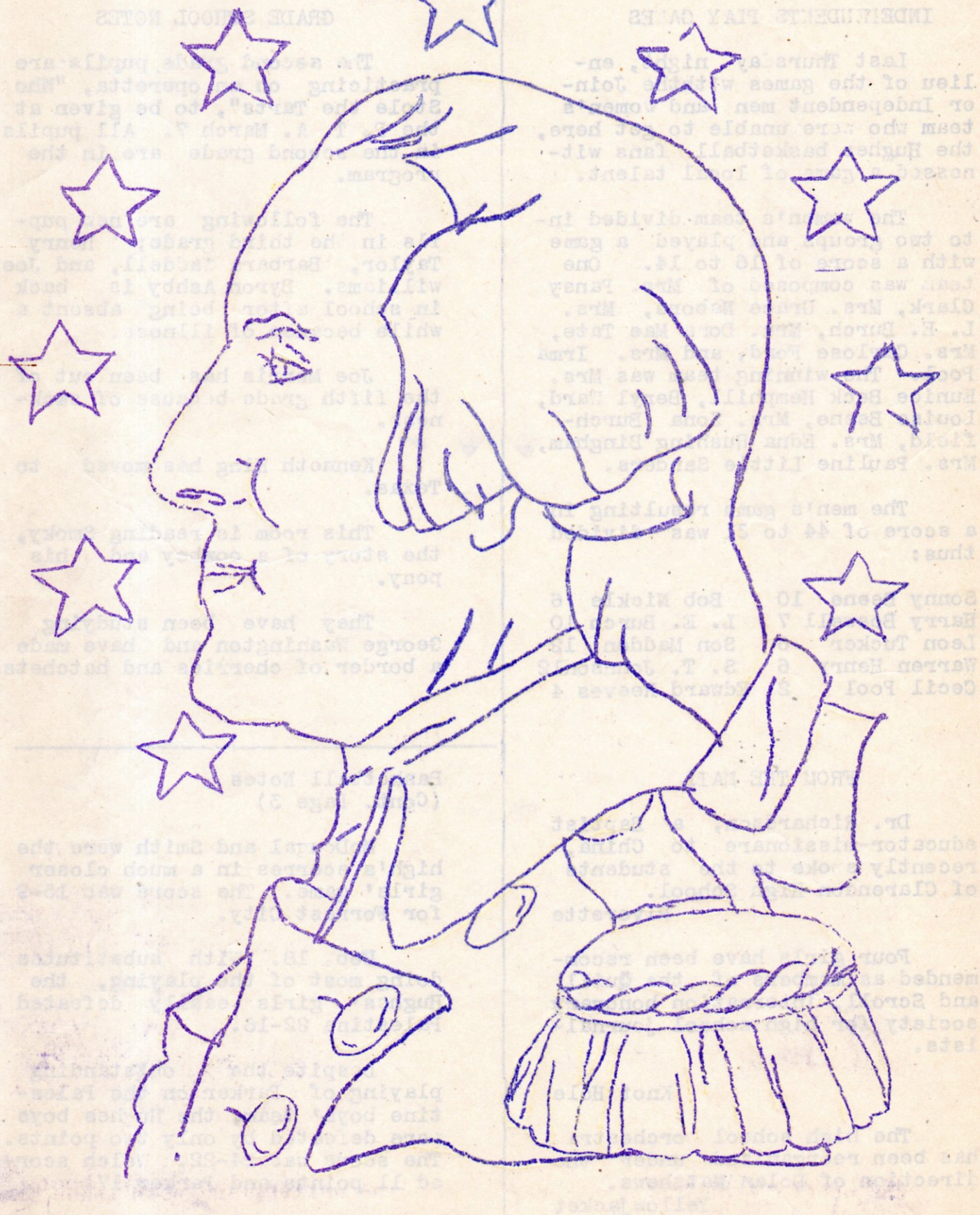

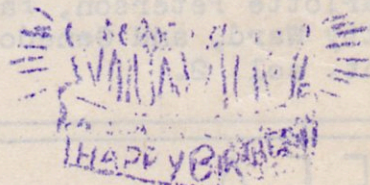
