The seniors came second. They have had only three members absent during this four week period. The ninth grade was third and the eleventh grade was fourth.

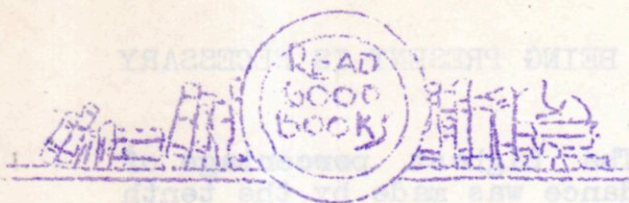
To get the most from his school life each student should be present every day. There is only one week left before six weeks tests will be given. Work must be taken seriously. Being present will help you in your learning.

Each patrol has an average of about eight members. Scoutmaster is Mr. Schwam.

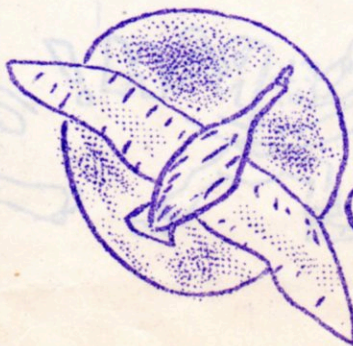

Gordon Griffith won a prize of one dollar for getting twenty-nine, the highest number of members got by any one person.

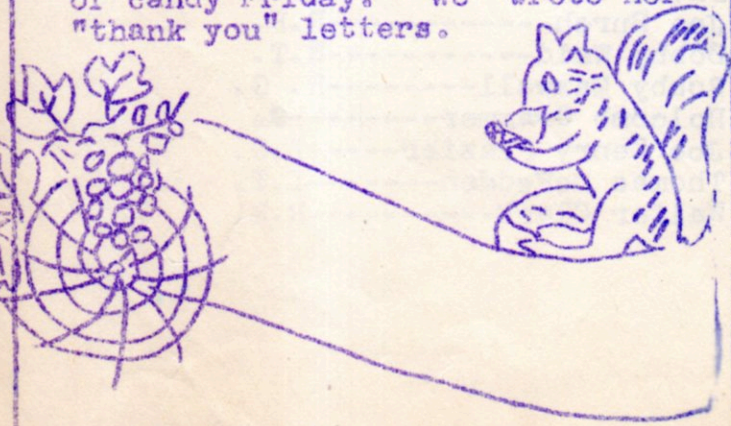

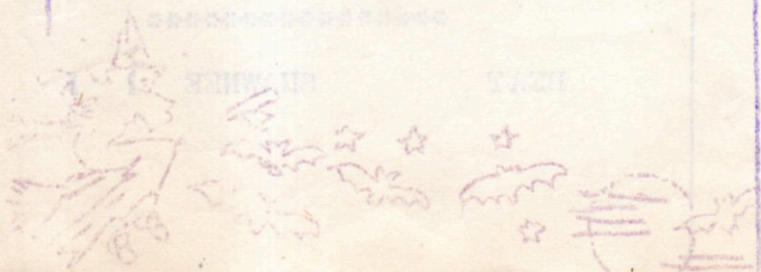



NELL PARKER IS CHOSEN GOOD CITIZENSHIP GIRL

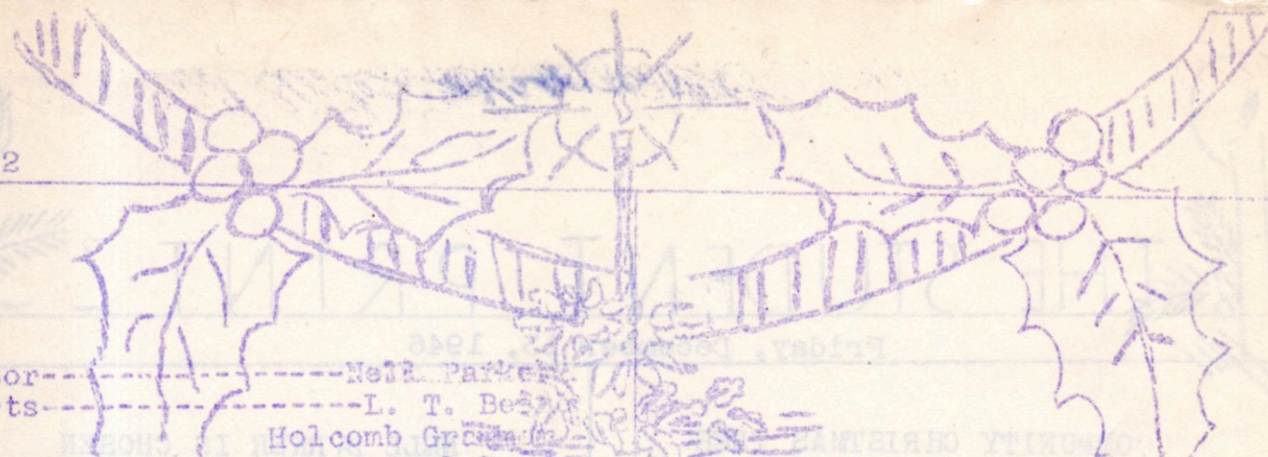
