BLUE DEVILS TAKE SECOND GAME OF SEASON

The rampaging Hughes Blue Devils defeated the Elaine Panthers by a score of 36 to 13 Friday night at Elaine. Though playing on a wet field, the Blue Devils showed plenty of speed and stamina as they won their second conference game of the season. This victory gave Hughes undisputed possession of first place in their conference with two wins against no losses.

The Blue Devils scored in every quarter. The first touchdown was scored by Joe Billy Little after intercepting a Panther pass and racing for 50 yards to score. Next to score was Bobby Collier, who ran around end for 20 yards for the first of the first half's scoring.

The third quarter began with the Blue Devils kicking to the Panthers and holding them for four downs. With Hughes having possession of the ball, they carried the ball down to the eight yard line, from there it was carried over by Leon Beene. Late in the third quarter, Paul Stovall ran off guard for the fourth Blue Devil touchdown which gave Hughes a 24-9 lead.

HOMECOMING PARADE TO BE ON FRIDAY

A big Parade will precede the Homecoming game between Hughes and Osceola. The parade will form in front of the new teacherage at 2:30 facing the Presbyterian church. Each float will be given a number and will line up accordingly. The route of the parade will be as follows:

BOYS TEAM EDGED BY CRAWFORDSVILLE 28-27

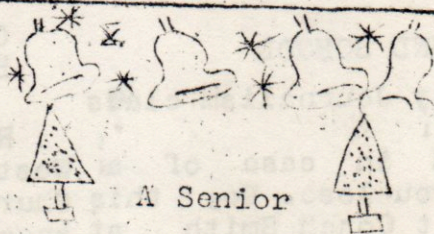
The Hughes Blue Devils were defeated by Crawfordsville in a thriller last Friday night by a score of 28 to 27.

The boys met with their second defeat of the season as the Turrell Rockets came from behind to win by a score of 28-29.

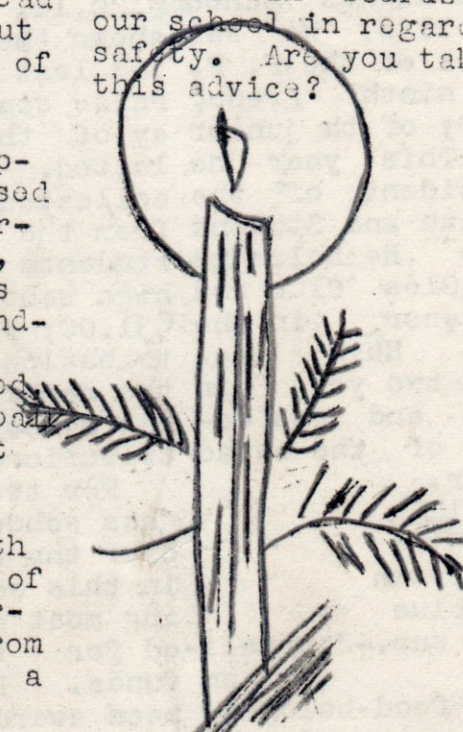
The game ended in a tie with the score being 27-27. During the overtime period the Rockets scored two free throws and the Blue Devils scored only one.

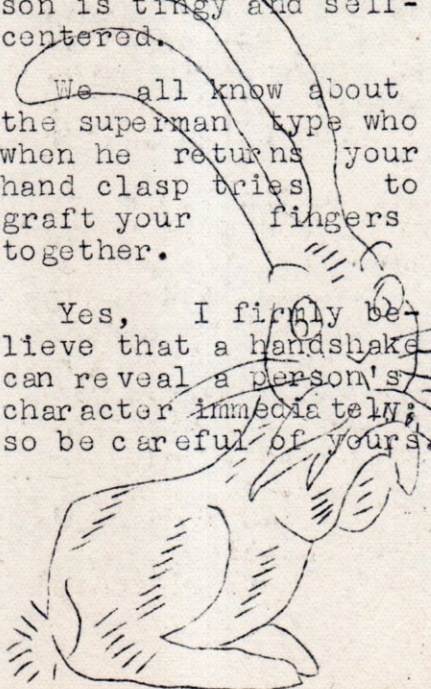

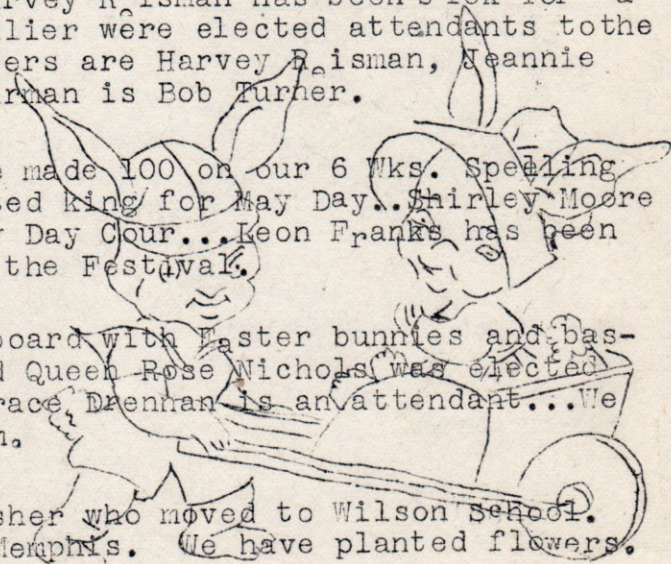

Mrs. B. W. Nininger of Little Rock, music director for the Sunday School Department of the State Baptist Convention, will have charge of the music.

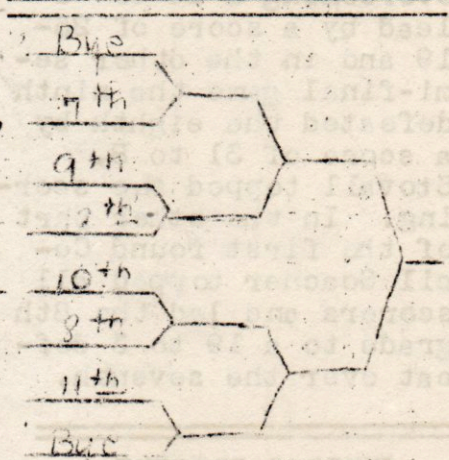
