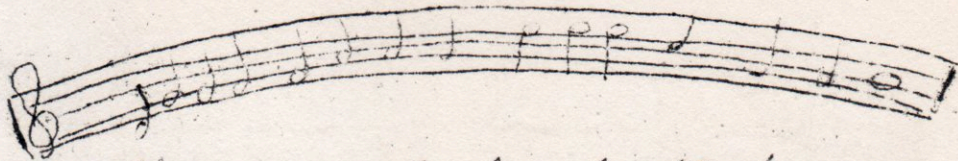

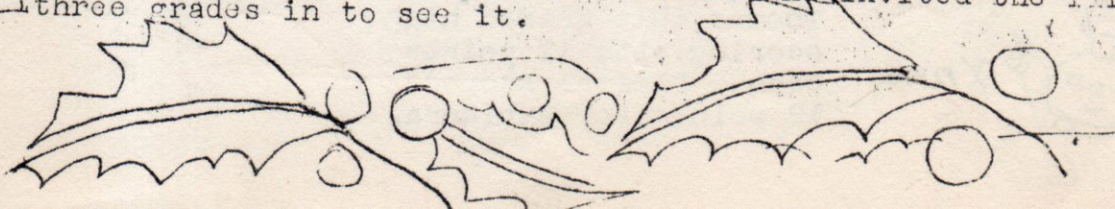

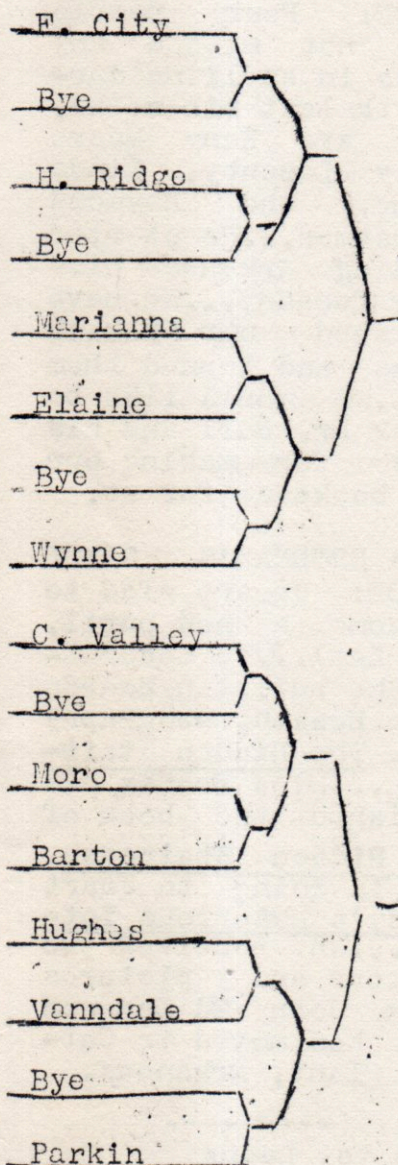

They discussed going to the F. H. A. convention which is held in Little Rock.

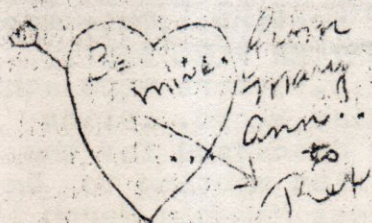

WILDLIFE FILMS

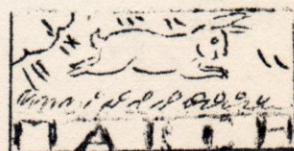

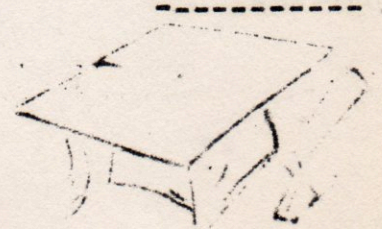
