The group from Hughes left Memphis by chartered bus with 74 other Arkansans and lunched in Davey Crockett's birthplace, Lawrenceburg, Tennessee.

On November 9, they visited Rock City and arrived at Dreher High School, Columbia that night.

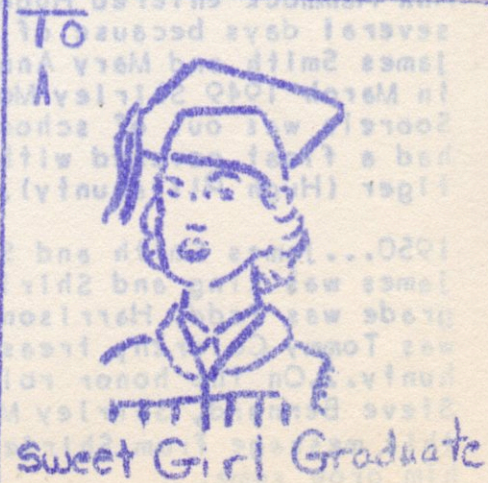

The Queen of Hearts was Shirley Moore; Jack-Be-Nimble was Teddy Harrison; Old Woman in the Shoe, Yvonne Hood; Bo-Peep, Elizabeth Adams; Ole King Cole, James Smith; Jill of Jack and Jill, Carey Beck; Miss Muffett, Carolyn Sorrels.

September 27, 1946, saw Teddy Harrison serving as monitor in the third grade. Tops in spelling for the week were Yvonne Hood and Elizabeth Adams. At the end of the first month of school in 1946 Carey Beck, Yvonne Hood, and Teddy Harrison were perfect in attendance. Those making 100 on spelling for the week of November 27 were Elizabeth Adams and Shirley Moore.

In January 1947, perfect in attendance were Shirley Moore, Yvonne Hood, Carey Beck, Elizabeth Adams, and Teddy Harrison and during the last six weeks of the year Carey and Hugh Dillahunty were perfect in attendance.

During the school year 1947-48 we had the following comments: For the picture show KINTER, a Congo adventure, Teddy Harrison and Carolyn Sorrels made the pictures while Yvonne Hood and Shirley Moore made the curtains... Vivian White and Thomas Cupples were perfect in attendance for the month of April... James Murray Smith, Shirley Moore, and Margaret Beene were planting flowers... Elizabeth Adams, Teddy Harrison, and Carolyn Sorrels brought things from Japan for the class to see... Mr. Charles Adams, Toots' father, provided transportation for the fourth grade to go to Blue Lake on a picnic... Ill with measles this year were Toots Adams, Carey Beck, Yvonne Hood, and Billy Cupples... New members of the class this year were Margaret Beene, Tommy Beene, and Joan Spears... Bobby Medlin brought a book from home to be read to the class.

In April 1949, Mary Ann Hammock and Hugh Dillahunty were selected as attendants in the May Day festival... James Murray Smith won a dollar for selling the most tickets to a novelty basketball game... Bobby medlin, Steve Bernard, Billy White, Horace Drennan received basketball suits... Hugh Dillahunty was basketball manager... Elizabeth Adams was elected chairman of the bulletin board committee. Others on the committee were Carolyn Sorrels, Shirley Moore, Tommy Beene, Teddy Harrison... Mary Ann Hammock entered Hughes School this year... Shirley Moore missed several days because of illness... Joan Spears missed school with mumps. James Smith and Mary Ann Hammock made cookies for the fifth grade... In March 1949 Shirley Moore brought two books on birds... Carolyn Soorels was out of school with mumps... In the seventh grade this group had a float covered with jungle brush... Inside a cane cage was a wild tiger (Hugh Dillahunty). The slogan was "Hold that Tiger!"

1950... James Smith and Shirley Moore were among the May Day royalty. James was king and Shirley an attendant... Teddy Harrison in the absence of Rex Batchelor, regular quarterback, led the Blue Devils to a 19-0 victory over DeValls Bluff... Bobby Medlin scored two touchdowns in the DeValls Bluff game... Tommy Brist returned home from Campbell's Clinic.

In the tenth grade Teddy Harrison was president of the class; vice president was Carolyn Sorrels; secretary was Elizabeth Adams; treasurer was Mary Ann Hammock, reporter, Tommy Brist, and parliamentarian, Tommy Beene... On the tenth grade honor roll were Tommy Brist, Bonnie Tilley, and Tommy Beene.
