FFA TO REPRESENT ARKANSAS AT FAIR

Hughes Chapter of Future Farmers of America is representing the state of Arkansas at the Mid-South Fair beginning Friday.

Chapter members are planning to attend the Mid-South fair on Monday, September 24 as the chapter has entered two contests and will have an activity booth.

The booth will portray to the public the importance of small motors on the farm. Exhibits will be constructed by Mississippi, Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri and Arkansas, in space 11' by 8'2" deep with other appointments to fill the requirements of the individual states. \$150 expense will be allowed for travel and construction costs.

Grade school registration is about 353 which gives a total school enrollment of 671.

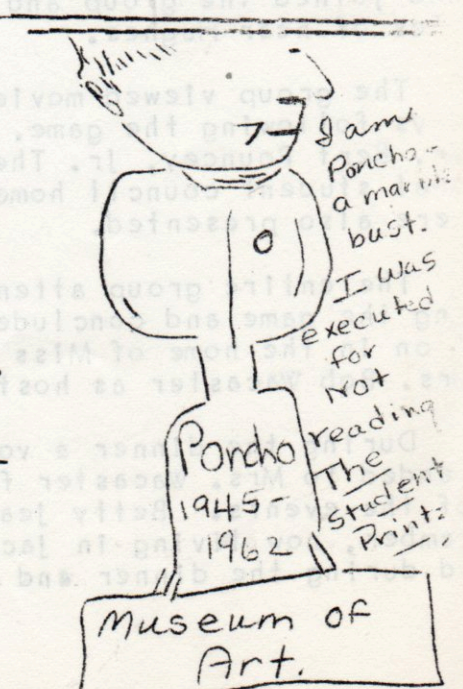

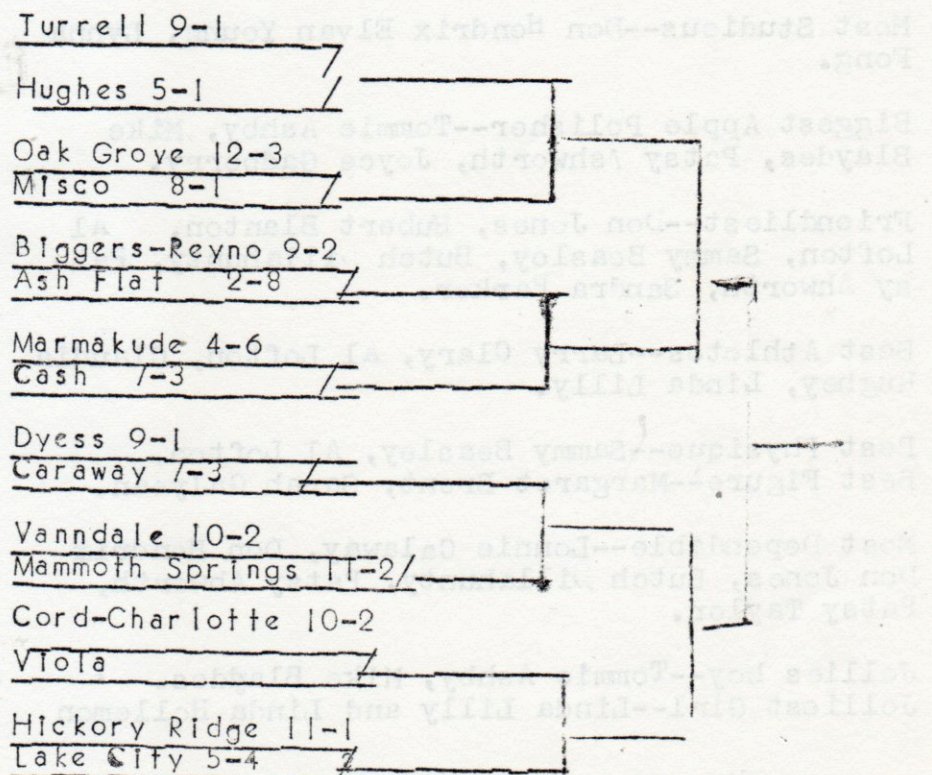
BLUE DEVILS TO ENTER NORTHEAST ARKANSAS

The prices at the concession stand are the same as those charged at most other places you visit for a game.
8. Once you have come to a session, stay until it is over. Don't make a practice of going out to the cars, going to town, and then coming back, or using any sort of excuse to be on the go.
9. Encourage younger spectators to really be spectators and not to run or slide around in they gym or play in the dressing rooms. In addition to be annoying, this is a good way to be injured.

In fact, just be courteous, friendly, and considerate of others and the outcome of the tournament will take care of itself.

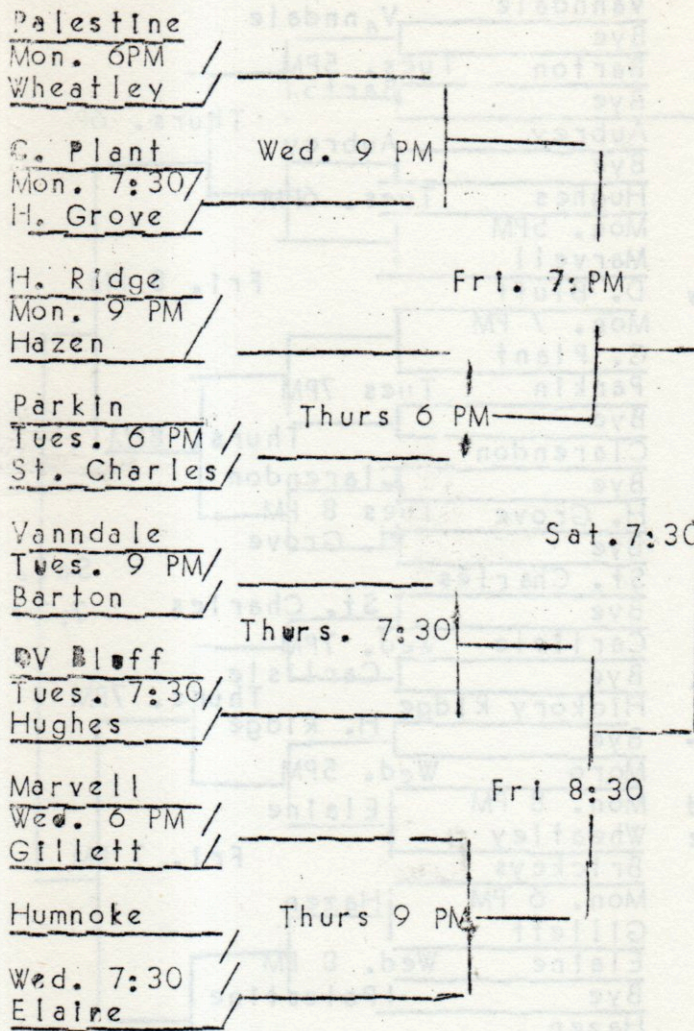

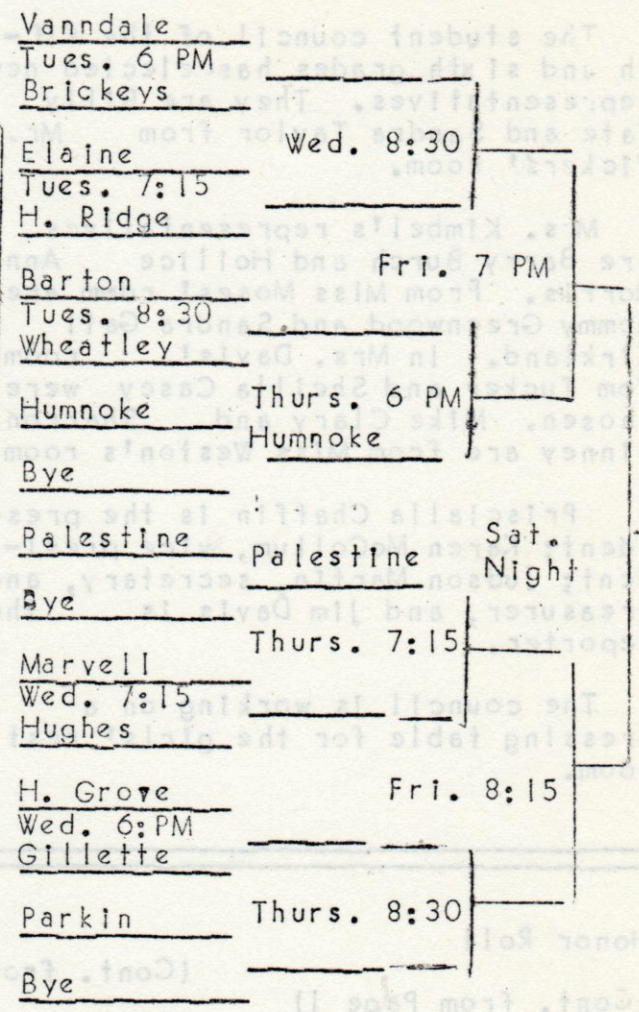
