Priscilla Chaffin was chosen as the president of the Hughes Junior Garden Club which met September 14 in the home, economics cottage.

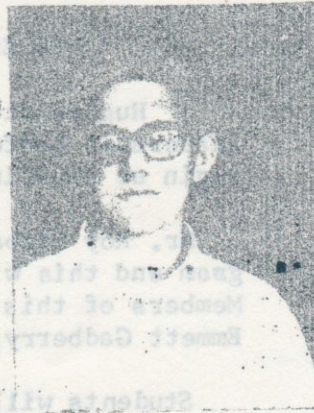

DAVID BURCH IS MERIT SEMIFINALIST

David Burch, a senior at Hughes High School, has been named one of the semifinalists in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship Contest.

This year there are 151 semifinalists in Arkansas and 14,000 throughout the United States. They constitute less than one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the nation.

According to the president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation these young people will be the future leaders of business, industry, and the professions.

David will take a second test in December. He will be endorsed by his school and complete the necessary papers required for further competition.

After this he will become eligible for one of about 2400 scholarship financed by more than 400 different agencies.

BAND INVITED TO LIBERTY BOWL PARADE IN MEMPHIS

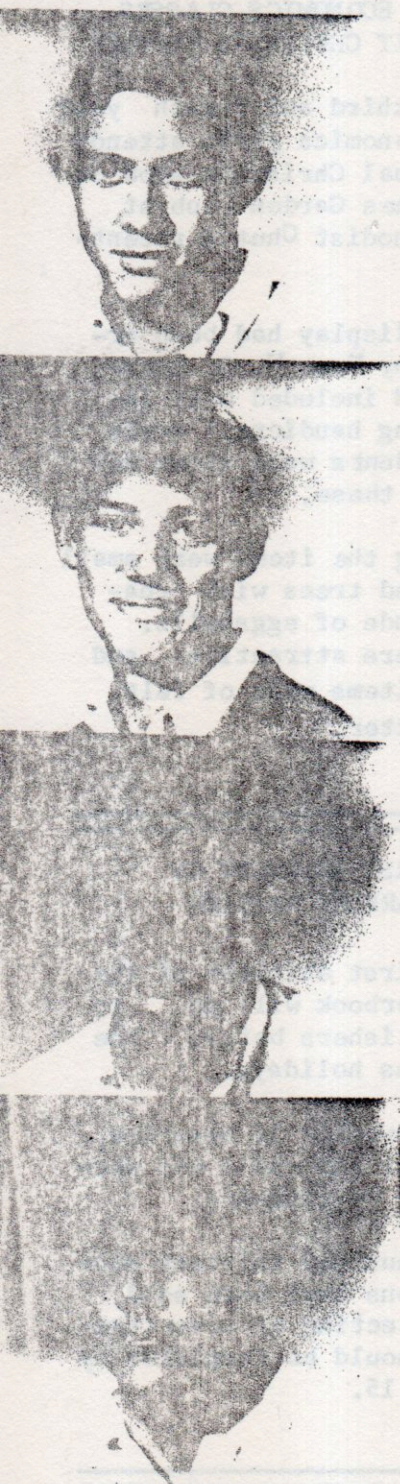
On December 16 the band will participate in the Liberty Bowl parade in Memphis. This parade is reported to be televised and will be shown as part of the half-time program.

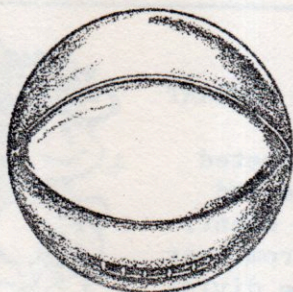
On Saturday, December 2, the band marched in the Christmas parade in Forrest City.

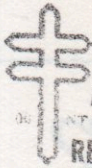

TUBERCULOSIS AND ITS CAUSES

What is tuberculosis? Tuberculosis is one of the most important diseases when death and disability are considered. As one of the respiratory diseases it belongs to the group which causes more time to be lost from work and school than any other.

How is this disease caused? It is caused by a germ which is distributed in the air by sneezing and coughing. When the germs are breathed in by a healthy person, they go first to the lungs. This is the planting of the disease.

Symptoms? One who has tuberculosis may begin to feel sick, feel tired, all the time, have a fever, or sweat at night. He may lose weight, catch colds easily, cough a lot, or have blood show in the sputum.

Cure? Tuberculosis can be cured a great deal faster today than it formerly was. The three principal drugs used are streptomycin, isoniazid, and PAS (paraminosalicylic acid). The drugs do not actually kill germs. They keep the germs from multiplying, thus giving the body a chance to fight them. There are still some cases where surgery is needed, chiefly to get rid of damaged parts of the lung and the germs at the same time. For the most part today, drugs are the major form of treatment.

Tuberculosis is on the decline because of intensive research and donations on the part of millions of Americans throughout the years. They have bought Christmas seals and made private donations.

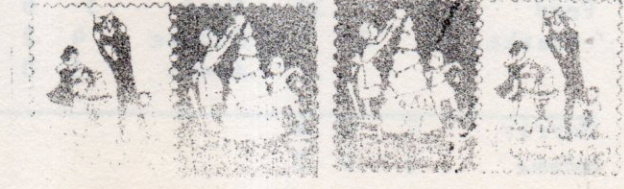

Miss Janie Webb, math teacher, was out several days this month because of illness.

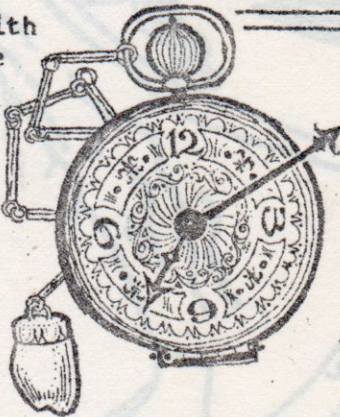


## FHA WORKS ON PROJECTS

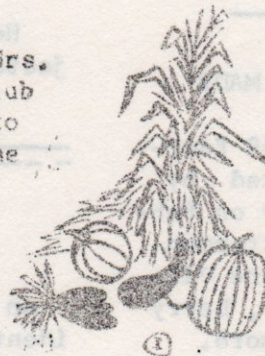

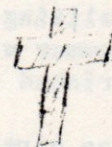

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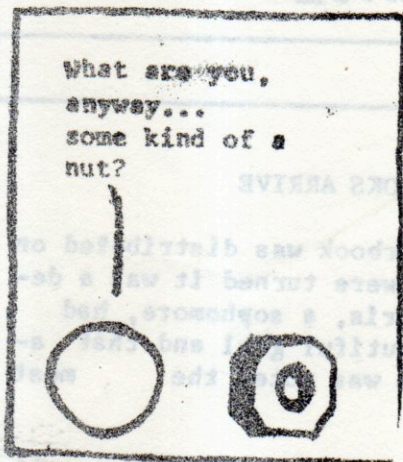
## GIRLS BASKETBALL LETTERS ARE ANNOUNCED

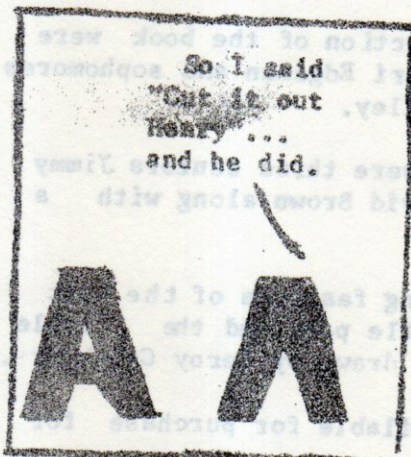

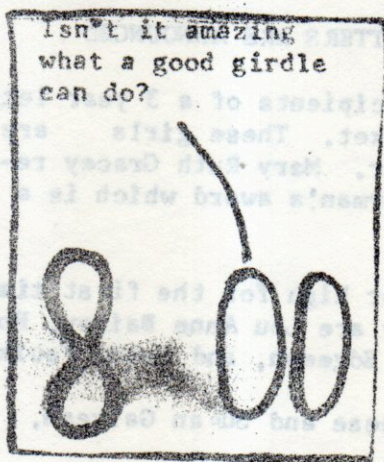

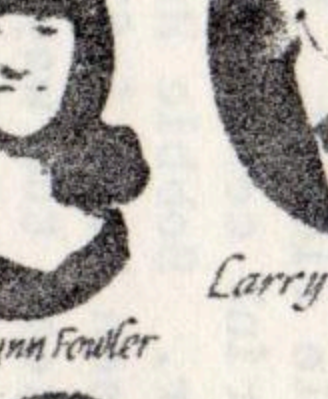
