With the forfeit from Keiser the Blue Devils now have a win record of four with a loss of two. This forfeit from Keiser will be the only Conference game won.

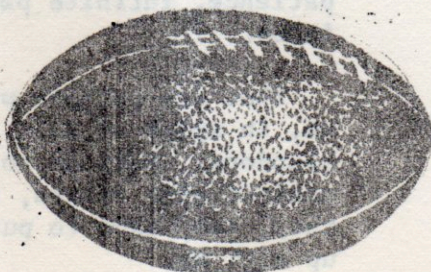
The first game of the season was played at Elaine on September 5 when the Devils won 12-0. Danny Vaden made a fine catch going into the end zone for a touchdown. The Devils failed to make the PAT. Danny Goacher carried the ball into the end zone for the second tally but the PAT again failed.

The second game of the season was played against Luxora and was a home game. Luxora defeated the Devils 0-28. Coach Staggs remarked that "only once in his six-year career at Hughes had he seen a physically stronger and quicker team than Luxora."

The next game for the Devils was played at Hughes against the Earle Bull Dogs and ended with a 0-6 score. Barry Burch made the first Blue Devil touchdown by catching a Bentley pass. Burch then snagged another pass for a two-point conversion, making the score 8-6. Earle came back and made another touchdown. The second touchdown for the Devils came when Danny Vaden took a two-yard pass into the end zone. Billy Ray Bryant ran the conversion. The next TD came for the Devils on a two-yard run by Bentley. The PAT failed. Earle came back with a touchdown making the score 22-18. Late in the fourth period Earle made another touchdown which made a score of 22-24.

Hughes refused to accept the come-from-behind drive of Earle and began marching toward the Bulldog goal with only a minute to play. However, after closing 54 yards, a fumble was covered by the Bulldogs with only seconds remaining on the clock; and they ran out the last few seconds for a victory.

Billy Ray Bryant led the Devil's yardage with 60, followed by Harold Jackson with 50, and Dillard Brown with 40.

September 26 was an open date for the Devils, but a game was scheduled for that date with Harding Academy from Memphis. Hughes jumped out quick with a 30 yard touchdwon run by Harold Jackson. Bentley made the 2-point conversion.

Harding Academy came right back and scored. The PAT was blocked by Bill Tate. The visitors made the second touchdown. Brown made the next tally for the Devils with about two minutes left in the half. Bentley made the two-point conversion. Hughes led 16-14 at halftime.

Early in the third period Harding made a touchdown thus leading 22-16. Late in the third period, Brown made a five yard run for a touchdown. Jackson made the two-point conversion, and the score was 24-22. This was the final game score.

Jackson was the leading ground gainer as he covered 127 yards in 13 carries with one touchdown. Brown had 38 yards in 8 carries with two TD's. Barry Burch caught five Bentley passes good for 54 yards to be the leading receiver in the game. Bentley hit on 11 of 19 passes and had one intercepted. Hughes ran up a total of 344 yards on offense and had 227 of those yards on the ground.

The hardest fought game of the season gave Hughes a 2-2-0 record after they defeated the Marion Spartans who went into the game with a 2-0-2 record.

The Devils fought the Spartans to a 0-0 score at the half. With 6:57 left in the third period Bentley threw a touchdown pass to Burch and then made the conversion.

Hughes won by a score of 8-0. Brewer Huber recovered three of the five Marion fumbles. Barry Burch caught 8 out of 9 passes good for 108 yards and one touchdown.

Last week the Devils were scheduled to play Keiser but picked up a win by the forfeit.

Next week's game will be at Barton on October 17. Devils need the support of the fans.

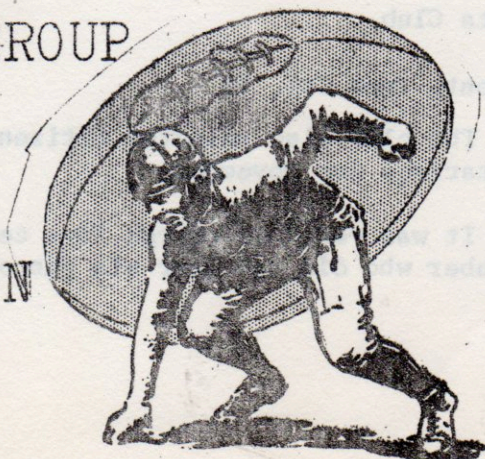
These two events are called most unique idea and anything goes. A total of 100 points can be earned during the week.

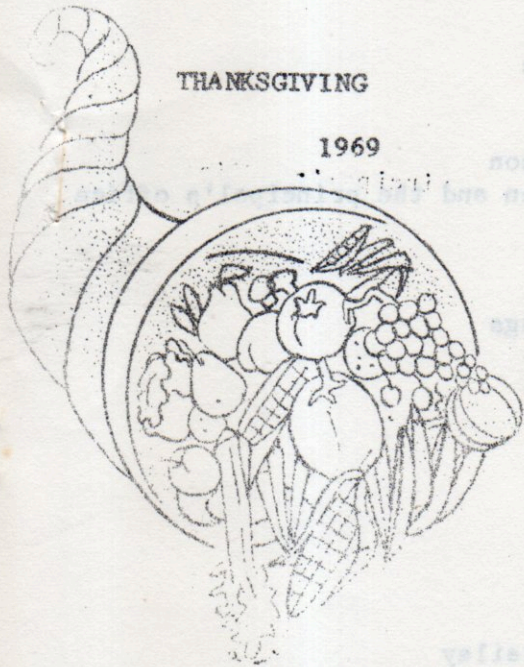

The test offers to outstanding students an opportunity to earn college money of from \$500 to \$5000.



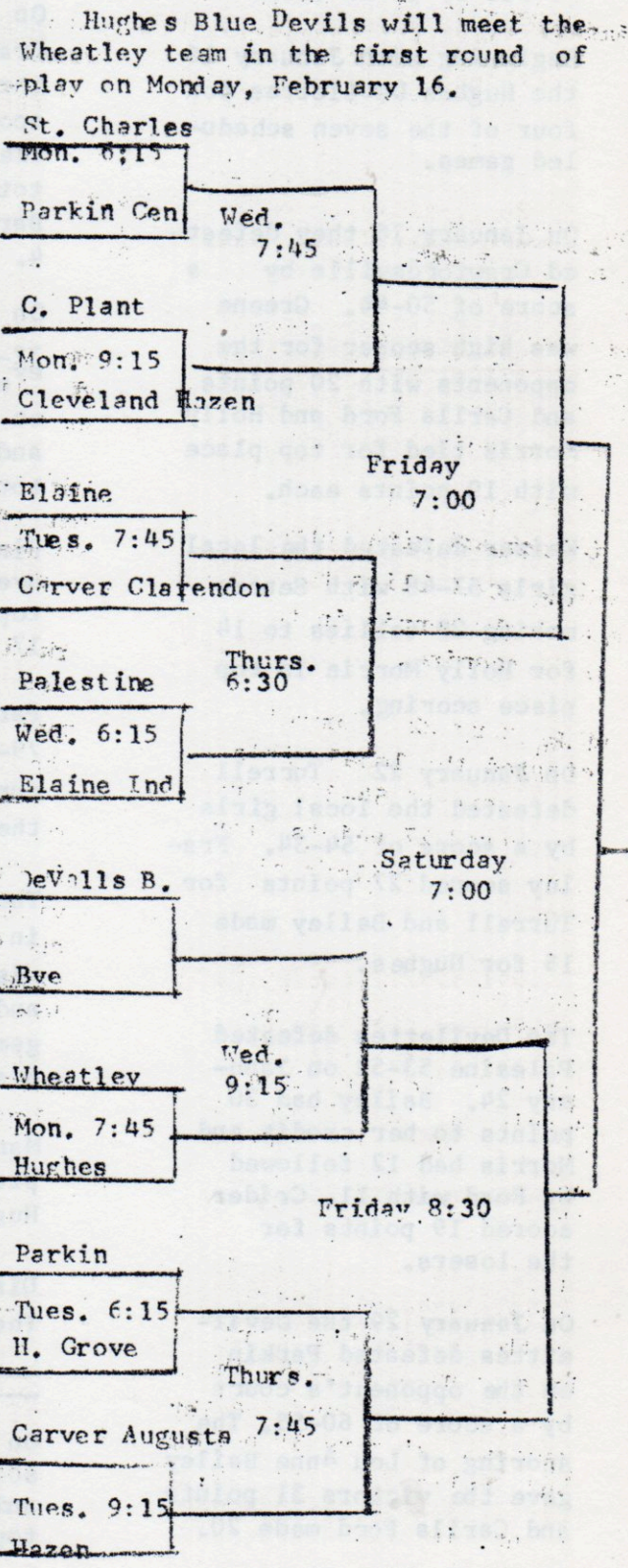

5. Poster shall be no larger than 24 x 36 inches. Each candidate may have no more than five posters and each of these shall be posted in a different area or room subject to the approval of the teacher in charge of that particular room or area.
6. Campaign expenditures shall not exceed \$3.50.
7. If runner-up is 10 votes short of top candidate a run-off will be held.

Each candidate must keep an accurate list of the expenditures related to the campaign. This must be turned in by 8:30 on Tuesday morning, March 31. It may be given to either Barry Burch or Nancy Beasley.

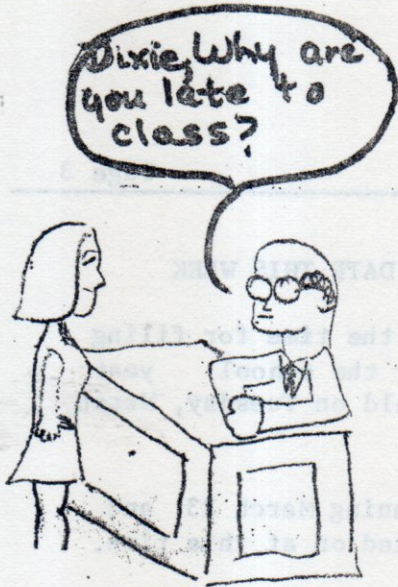
ART ON DISPLAY AT LOCAL BANK

The event had been scheduled since homecoming because the Hughes boys overpowered the Wilson Bull Dogs in this game.

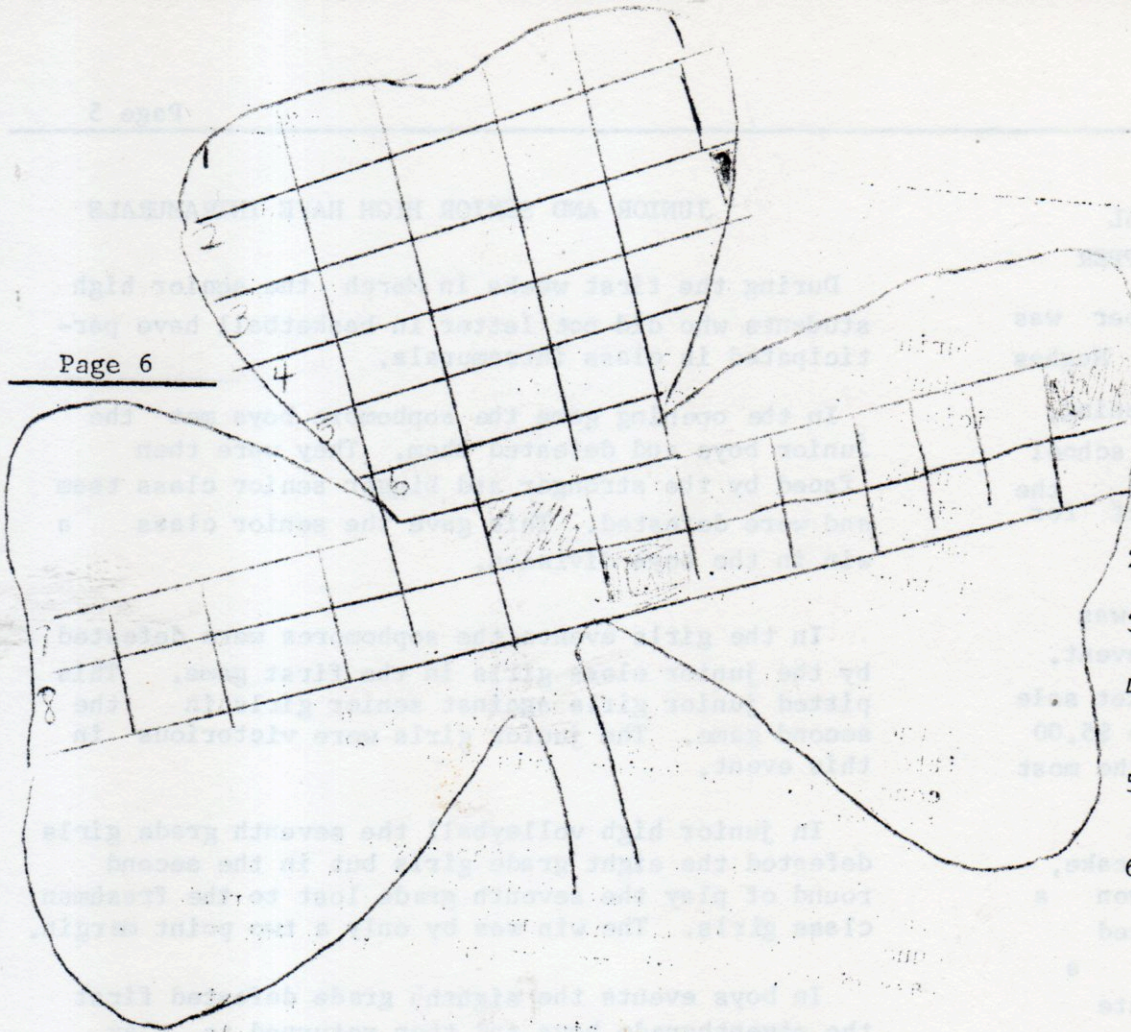

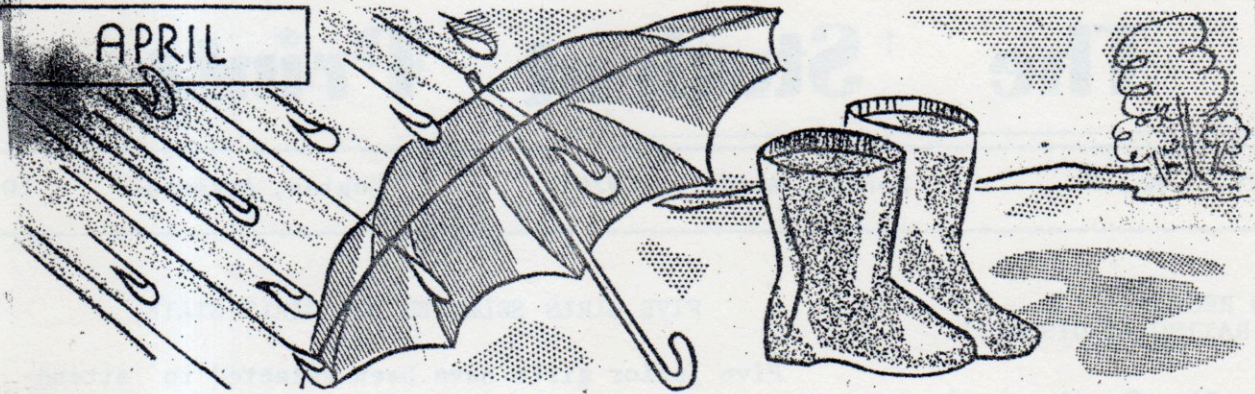
Nancy Beasley defeated Rip Porch for the office of vice president. Debra Conner was elected secretary by eliminating Billie Carolyn Bayer in a close race.

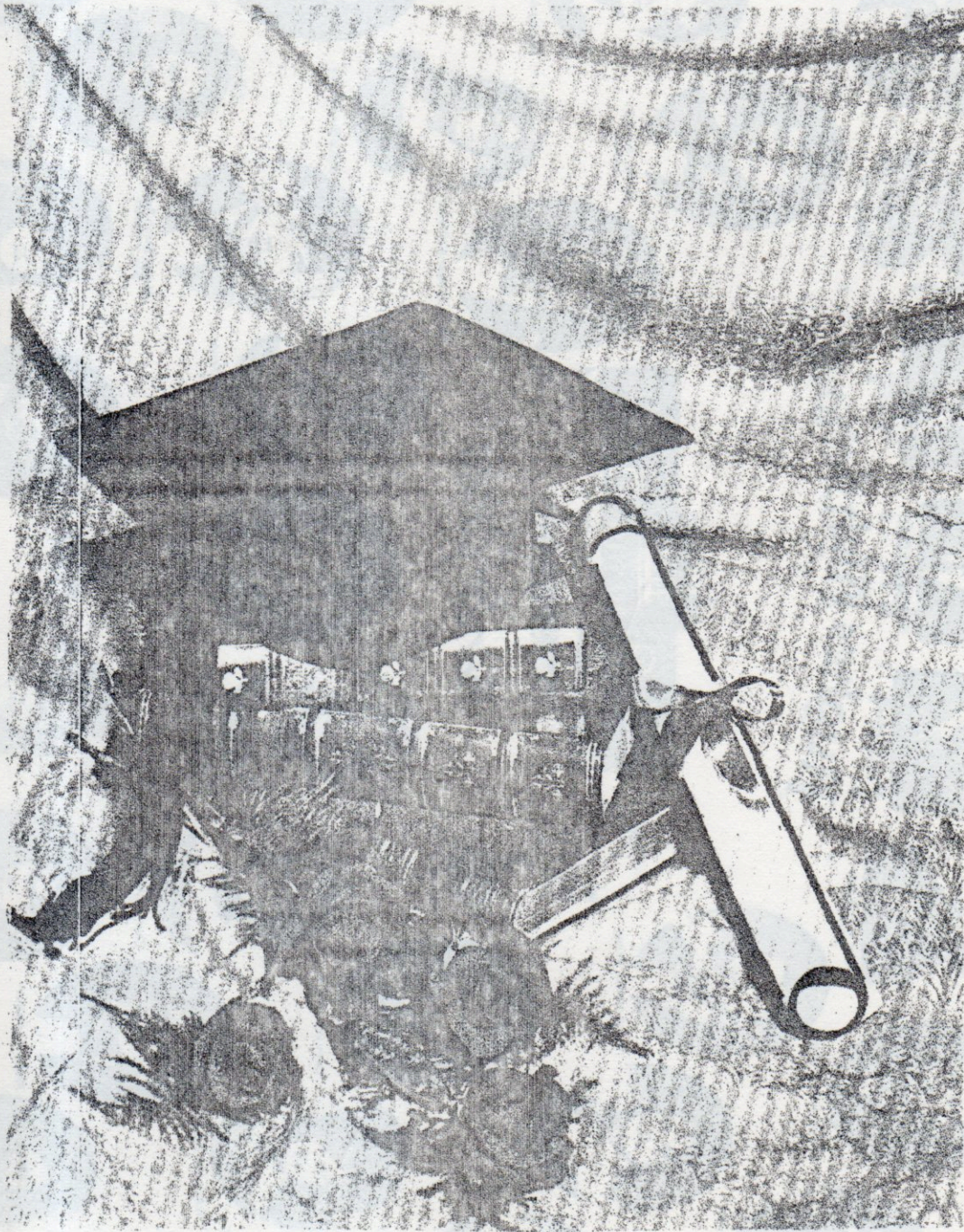

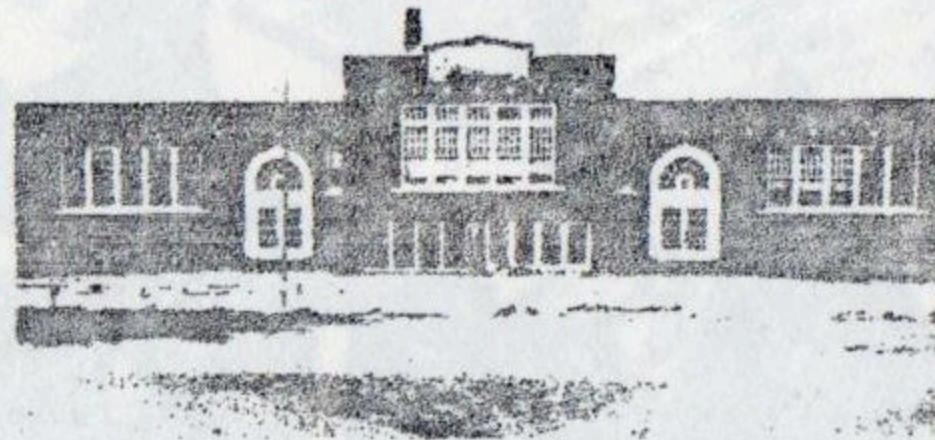
