The Devils received their first set-back when they encountered the Luxora Panthers at Luxora. The big Luxora team scored 24 points. The Devils could not manage a major threat against the tough Panther offensive.

The Davils were defeated 20-6 by the Earle Bulldogs on September 18. Danny Goacher again broke for a long touchdown run for Hughes' only score.

An inspired Devil team lost to Marion next by a score of 18-16. Danny Goacher tallied on a two yard plunge and Harold Jackson picked up a Spartan fumble and raced 58 yards as time was running out. Sam Fong and Danny Goacher accounted for the two points.

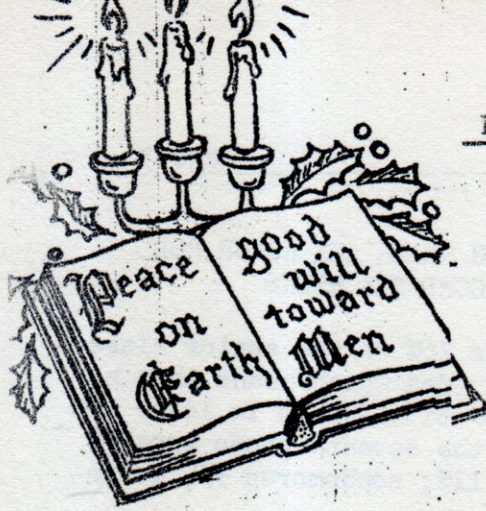

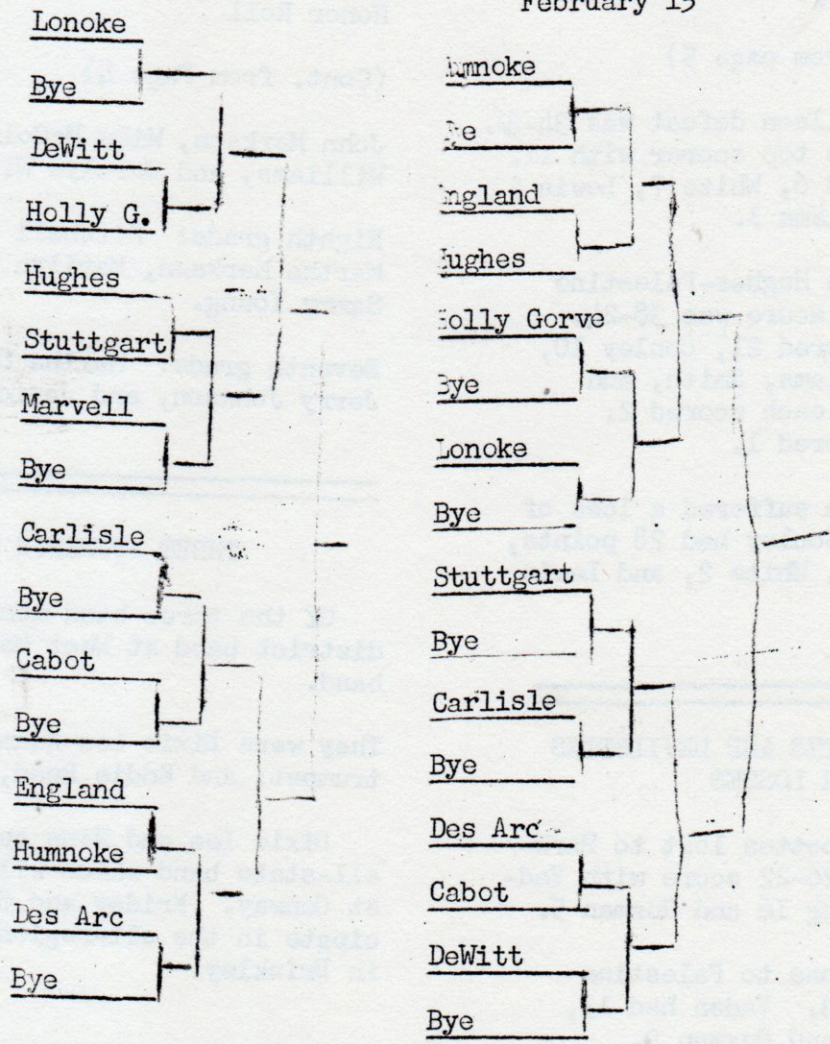

9. Be like a doctor. Diagnose before you act. Understand what is wrong before you start prescribing.
10. Take it easy! Snap judgments lead to trouble. Think it over.
