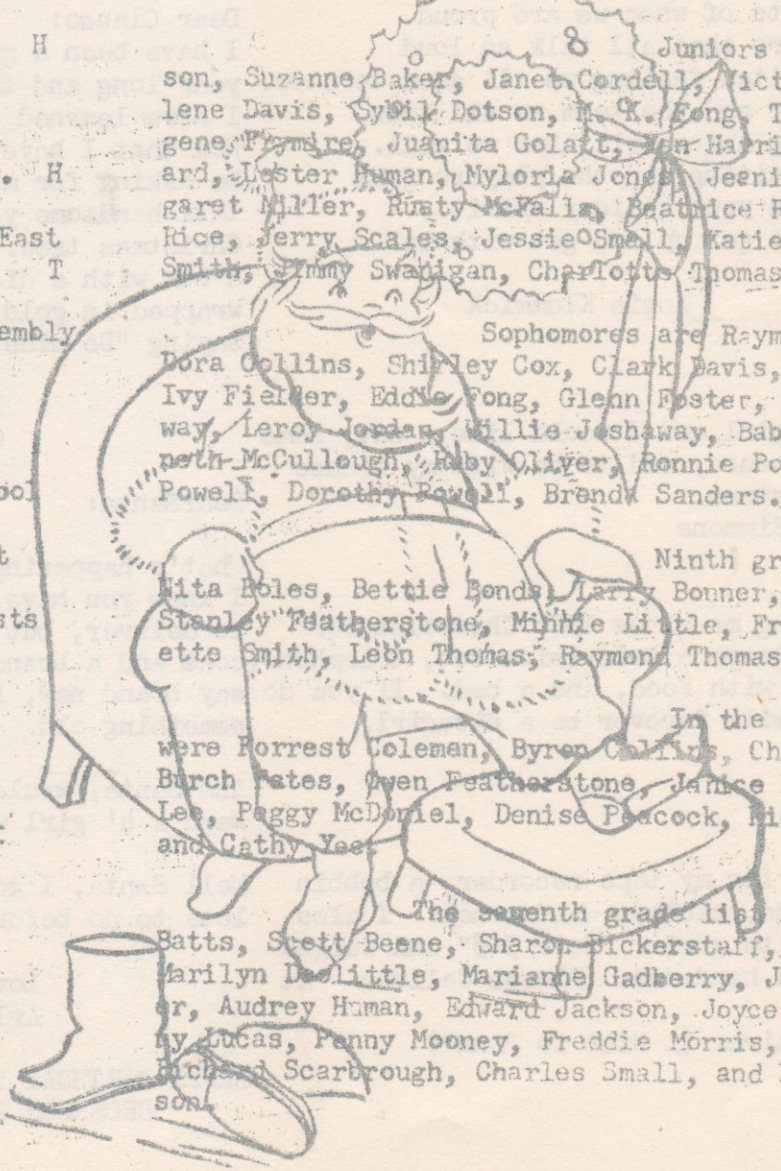

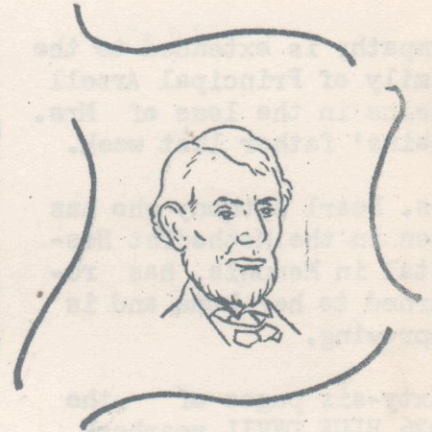

4. The state scholarship program which was in operation last year will have forms out in about another month.

5. A number of colleges give scholarships to students who rank in the upper 10% of their class. (In HHS this would be about the top 15 students) They also give aid for scoring about 23 on the ACT. It is only necessary that you select the college which you definitely plan to attend and then begin work on meeting its requirements for aid.

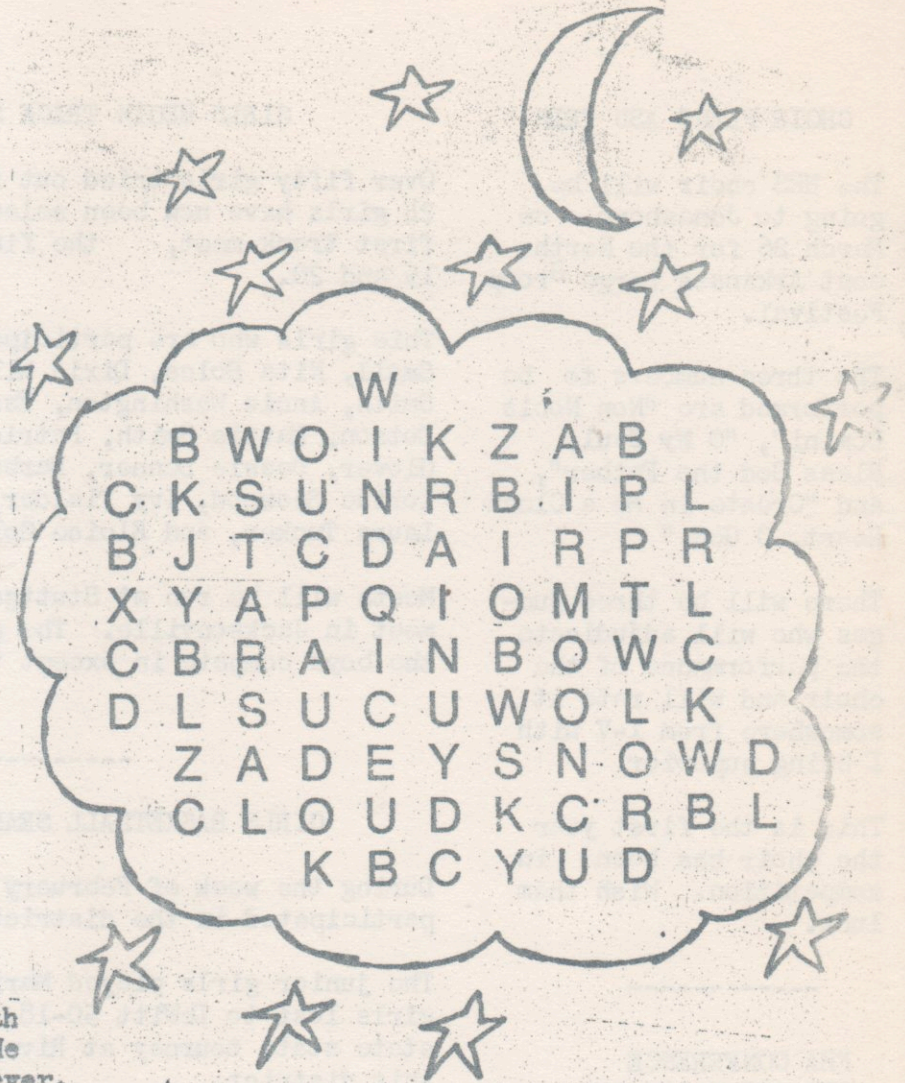

Our famed Liberty Bell was cast by Thomas Lester at White-chapel, London, England.

It arrived in Philadelphia in August 1752.

It was first used in the State House at Philadelphia on August 27, 1752.

It was recast twice by Pass and Stow in Philadelphia in September 1752.

It was muffled and tolled on December 5, 1765 upon the arrival of the Royal Charlotte with stamps from England.

It was again muffled and tolled on October 21, 1765 when the Stamp Act was put into operation.

It summoned the people to a meeting to prevent the landing of cargo of tea from the Polly on December 27, 1774.

It summoned a meeting of patriots on April 27, 1775, after the battle of Lexington.

It took its first journey from Philadelphia to Allentown, Pennsylvania in September 1775 to escape capture by the British.

It proclaimed the "Birth of a New Nation" on July 8, 1776.

It was returned to Allentown on June 27, 1778.

It announced the surrender of Cornwallis at Yourktown on October 24, 1781.

It was proclaimed the treaty of peace on April 16, 1783.

It tolled for the death of George Washington on December 20, 1799.

It was rung on the 50th Anniversary of the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1826.

It cracked in the tolling of the death of John Marshall on Uly 8, 1835.
