Do you realize how much food the Students and faculty consume each day? Here are just a few examples:

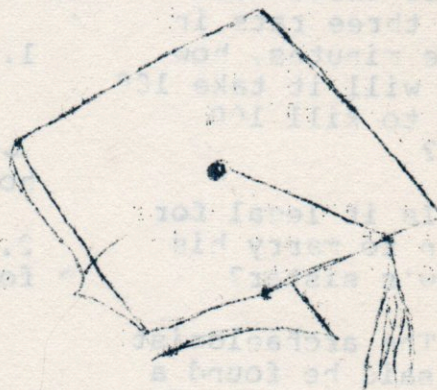
About 1000 cartons of milk are served each day.

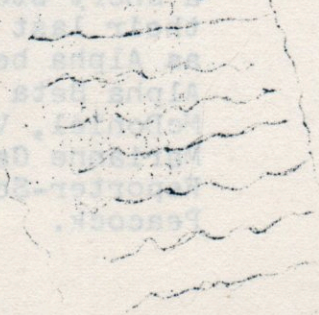

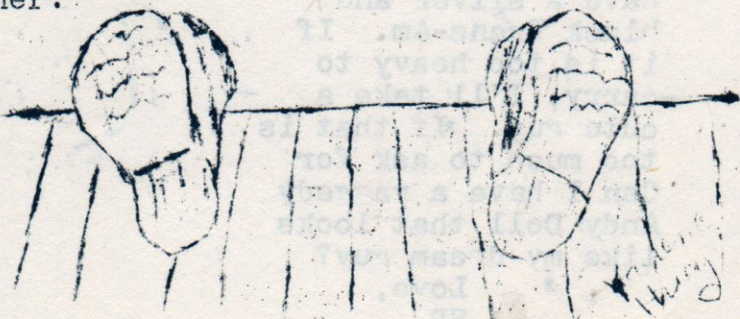
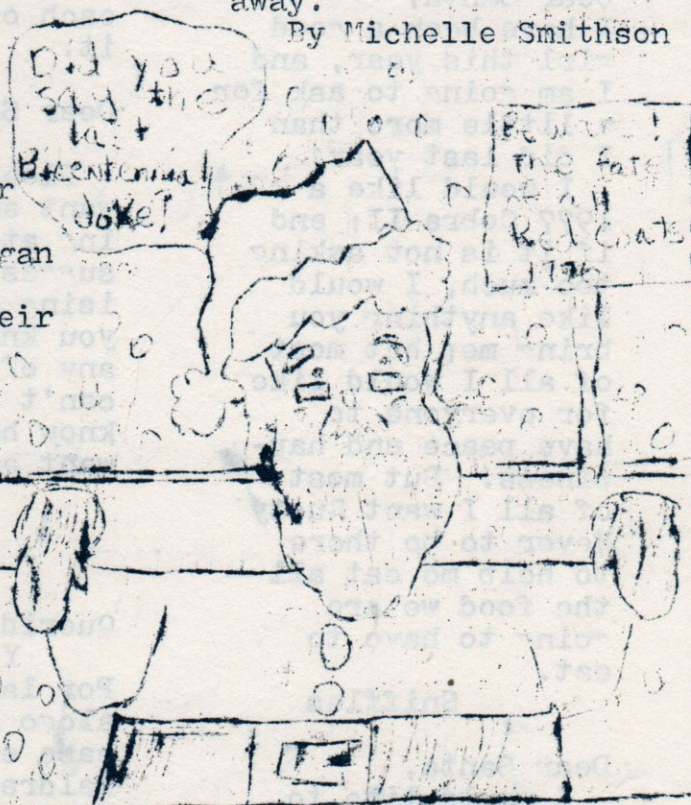

THE HHS BAND AND CHOIR

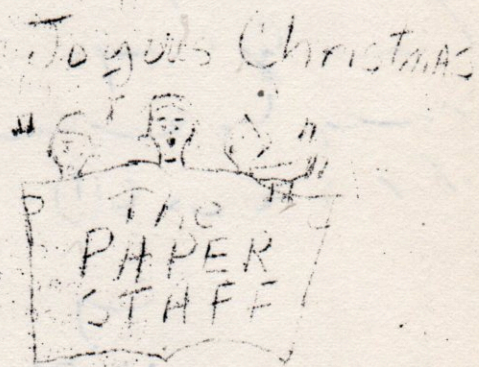
