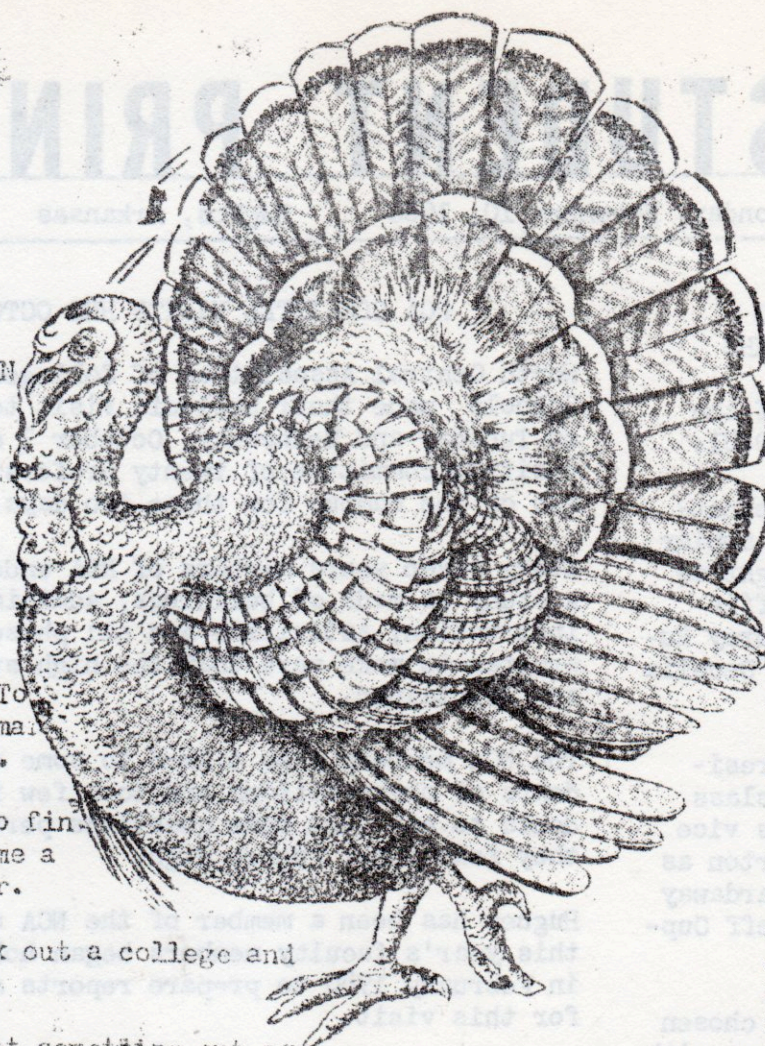

The opponents accumulated a total of only 11 points. Early in the year the team was hurt by injuries. Turner Meurrier and Andrew Fong suffered injuries before the beginning of the season.

The team finished the season with a second place in the conference where their record was 3-1.

Scoring for the season was 118-38 with 14.75 points average per game. They gave up an average of 4.75 points per game. This reveals that the Imps were only 11 points away from another undefeated season and 6 points away from another conference championship. Starting quarterback was Michael Hardaway. Lester Young, starting tailback gained 814 yards this season. Greg Starks was the fullback and gained 343 yards.

Other starters were Jeffery Michael, slot back; Murray Jenkins, split end; Jimmy Marshall, tight end. Tailbacks were Tim Parker and Alan McDonald. Guards were Leroy Smith and Booker Thomas and center was Eddie Reed.

Greg Starks was leader on defense with 51 assists and 12 unassisted tackles. Following close behind were Lester Young, Roy Broyles, Charles Bobo and Michael Thomas.

Blue Devil wins were Barton 18-6; Palestine 35-7; Parkin 34-6; Marked Tree 20-0 and Elaine 38-0. Losses have been to Earle 6-18; Turrell 13-22, Marion 0-10. Both Earle and Turrell have remained in the top five teams in the state in AA.

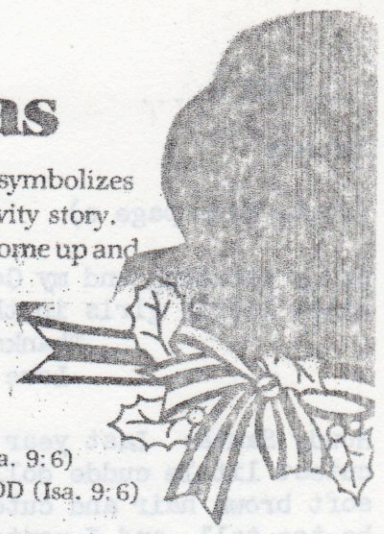
A report was heard on the mock election, the pictures, Veterans Day assembly, the Inter-City meeting at Stuttgart, and the scrapbooks.

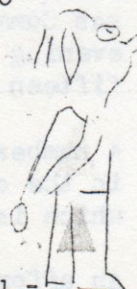

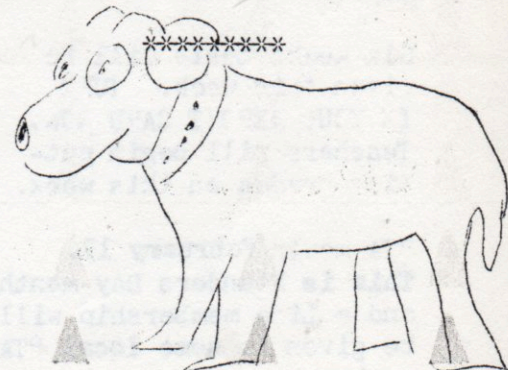

Prizes were awarded to these winners: First place to Rickey Davis; second place to Ezell Bailey and third when to Betty Yarbrough.

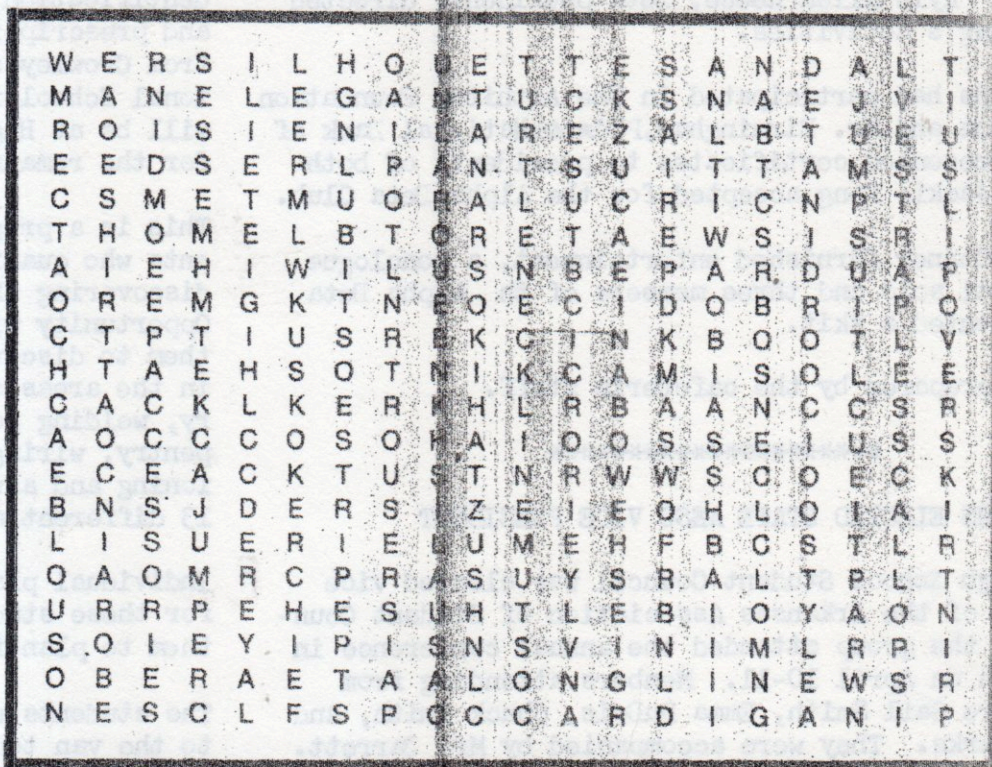

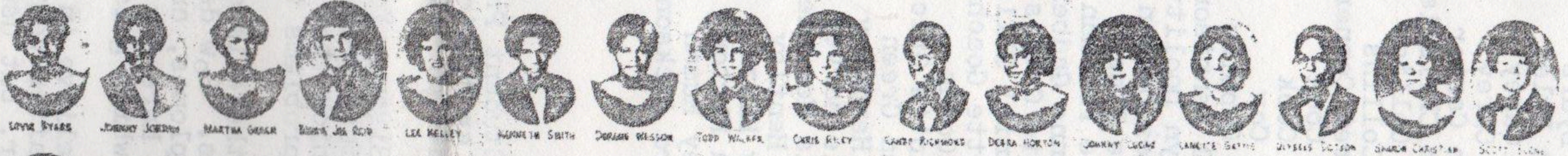

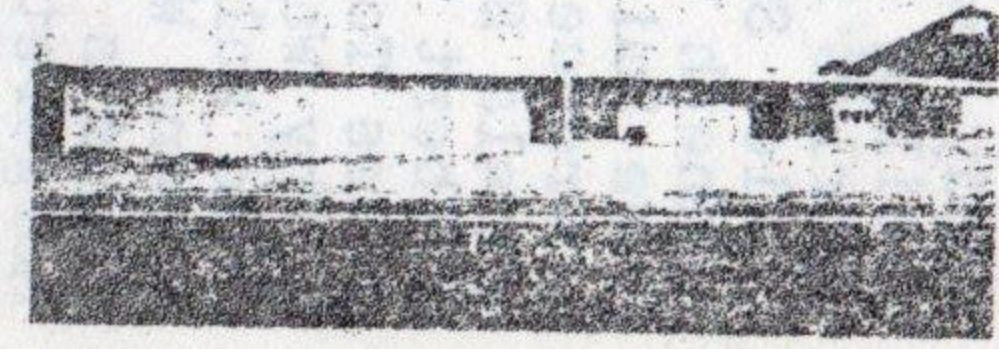
